





Q4 How satisfied are you with the level of professionalism and staff responsiveness provided?





Success Story

SC Works Greater Upstate hosted an International Talent Job Fair on September 29, 2023 to close out Workforce Development Month. This was the first event of its kind in the Upstate. All job seekers were invited to attend the event, however the main focus was to assist refugees who have recently moved into the area and who are non-native English speakers.

Spartanburg County has the largest Russian, Ukrainian and Slavic community on the east coast, as well as, growing communities of Afghani, African, Asian, and Hispanic refugees. Companies like Cooper Standard, Contec, and Draexlmaier have already been working with members of these communities through partnerships with World Relief and Lutheran Christian Services. Hiring refugees into open roles has been a very positive experience for them.

Employers shared that they thought the event went very well and that this type of job fair is something that has needed to happen for a long time. The event saw more than 70 job seekers come through and meet with employers who want to hire them, and local organizations who can provide services to those who need them.
